Don and I visited two supporting churches this quarter. We are grateful to our faithful supporters who have been working right along with us, providing support for years. On March 23, we celebrated the conclusion of **42** years with Midwest Indian Mission, Inc. We arrived here in Crandon March 23, 1975. Everything that we owned fit into our little blue Ford Pinto. Hardly seems possible!! Philippians 1:6 “For I am confident of this very thing, that He who began a good work in you will perfect it until the day of Christ Jesus.” The Lord has provided our needs for many years. We are grateful.

We had a barrage of break downs in the second week of February. Our vehicles all broke down in the same week. Don was towed twice and he suggested I not drive my car until it had working brakes again!!! The garage where we take our vehicles, felt bad for us! Our refrigerator also quit that same week. All we could do is thank the Lord we were all ok. The vehicles are all back on the road and our food is much colder than it has been with a new refrigerator! Then last week the kitchen stove started throwing sparks, Don suggested I not use it!!! We are so grateful for several people who called, sent financial help and paid for several of the expenses in whole! Praise the Lord for supplying our needs.

I send my greetings to you as winter continues. Sometimes a ministry is canceled due to snow storms or freezing rain. My goal is zero accidents.

Each Sunday I wait patiently for my gifts to walk into the building at church. E. has been out of sorts the last two weeks. He comes and listens sometimes and sits by himself. H. loves to make things and is getting better in her reading. V. is my oldest at 14. He wants to come to church, but not adult church. Challenged by trying to teach a class 6-14 years I found myself begging God for help. No comfort zone here. V. has been coming for the past three weeks and participating. These kids wake up, dress and head to church by foot or bike. Rick takes them home after church. I invite their dad to come when there is a feast. Then there is S. He can only come when his grandma has someone to watch his grandpa, as he recovers from a stroke. Pray for my kids to have a hunger for hearing God's Word.

Tuesday brings Ladies Bible Study. I keep praying for one more lady to join us. We have been studying God's Names, promises and Psalms using Bible verse coloring books from CBD. We study the passage, memorize the verse then review each section. I bring copies and leave them on the table. Pray for these papers to be taken home. It is my goal to get God's Word into the homes of the Annishinabi (the people). Each holiday I like to bring small things to share, candy or decorations.

The second Wednesday night is pantry at church. I bring snacks to encourage people to sit and visit after their shopping is done. I'm very thankful for the money provided for buying food. Sometimes Feeding America doesn't have food for us to buy, so we go to the dollar store and Aldi. Everyone loves the give away tables. We love the boxes you have sent us. Pray for our people to want the Bread of Life, Jesus, for themselves.

We celebrated Christmas observing Advent and Christmas Eve service. It is different having it land on a Sunday. Looking forward to Easter.

We are having extensive plumbing done on the

Mission house. Pray that we will have the funds to complete the jobs. Thankful for the Mission men doing most of the work. We thought of buying a house, but only if we could find one in Mole Lake to be closer to church and our people. God has not opened that door.

Family news: We await the return of Josiah. What a long year. Will probably cry when I hear his voice stateside. Addisyn is in Kindergarten, Caleb in 4-K and Wyatt walking or running. I call him the Flash. Stephen and Jenna are fixing up their first home, and working. Hannah and Daniel are busy with their churches and working. Daniel loves to help out at the animal shelter in Crandon. I am afraid he will leave a beagle on my doorstep.

I am thankful for your care for us. Each card, phone call, box and visit mean so much to us. We are also looking for a church to come and put on a VBS for us in Mole Lake. How would God like you to spend a week this summer?

Spring is here and the snow is melting fast! This time of the year Benjamin has already tapped trees and started boiling sap to make maple syrup. This year he has 70 trees tapped in our front yard. The week ahead looks to be great weather for the sap to flow great! This means pancakes with fresh syrup will come soon. In

January Benjamin and I were able to finally get our bathroom remodeled which was worse than we had anticipated. There was rot and water damage right through the subfloor and we had to completely gut the whole room! We are thankful that there isn't a risk of mold and falling through the floor any more. Thank you to those that helped to fund the repairs! After our remodel, Benjamin and Don worked together to gut the drywall out of a few rooms in another Mission home as well as fix and repair one of the bathrooms in that home. I recently started updating the kitchen that we use for all of our summer ministry events with stain and paint. In the Mission gymnasium, Benjamin has been helping with getting donated clothes and items organized, weighed, stored and prepared for the next shipment. A couple years ago there was an update in the gym for a lower storage and the upper youth loft. At that time the basketball court lines were removed. Benjamin measured and painted new court lines last week. In February, Benjamin and I traveled to Michigan to a Mission's conference at a supporting church. We were able to share our ministry and make connections with individuals that have worked with us in past years with our summer events. I have been holding a weekly WholyFit (Gentle Body Power) devotional exercise class. I have been using this as an opportunity to help others with growth in their faith as well as a fundraiser for our Women's Group and different missions. As most of you know, I have Crohn's disease and over the past year I have struggled with this including many unknowns, new side effects, and medication changes. Because of this, sometimes things are put on hold or the things I can or can't do have been affected. Your prayers would be greatly appreciated.

Hope (16) has been very busy with all of the things she is involved in! She just finished up the H.S. wrestling season where she was the manager taking stats, pictures, washing gear and mats. She just recently had a part in the school drama production and also participated in Solo Ensemble for band. Just this past weekend she was chosen to go to State for forensics. We couldn't be more excited for her and all she has accomplished! Even with all these things she still has a job at our local grocery store. Mason (10) just finished a strong year of youth wrestling. This past weekend he wrestled at a regional qualifier. Out of an 8 man bracket, Mason took 3rd. He was one win away from going to state. We couldn't be more proud of his hard work and his great

sportsmanship. Mason also was able to be in his first elementary drama where he played Belle's father in Beauty and the Beast. Now he is getting ready for the next sport, Little League. JessiLee (8) is currently in "Saturday Morning Ballers" which is a Saturday morning camp that works with youth on all the fundamentals of basketball. 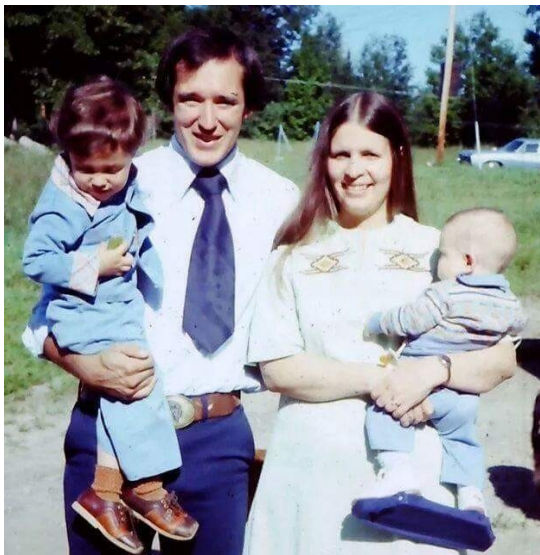

Spring is not generally my favorite season but I can appreciate it for its time, except the mud. I'm having a hard time appreciating the mud. I do appreciate the warmth and change from winter, while waiting not-so patiently for the blessing of the summer sun. More importantly I can marvel at the perfectly balanced orchestra of life and season God has given to both the saved and the unsaved alike. God is good.

Our youngest son, Jonah, is a freshman this year. He still appreciates the mud. Practice just started for his two favorite sports; baseball and trap shooting. He is impatiently waiting for the ice to clear from the lakes so he can go fishing. He is also getting excited for the spring turkey season. He loves spending time outside, shooting his bow, and hanging out with his brother. His Spanish teacher has made Spanish class his favorite high school subject, although I wish he was a little more excited about algebra. He is in both high school band and choir and is excelling at both. He recently performed 4 pieces for his regional solo and ensemble competition, 3 of which he scored perfect marks on and is going to the state solo and ensemble competition!

Chase is loving college and getting straight A's. He enjoys working with metal and is totally in his element learning what it takes to be a machinist. He continues to work about 20 hours a week while going to school full time. Michelle and I don't usually see him until he gets home from class at 10 at night. He spends his weekends fishing, shooting in an archery league, or going to the movies with his girlfriend Brooke. He saved up his money to buy a woods truck this fall. He also still appreciates the mud. He found one with enough miles on it to fit into his very limited budget. I think it's blue underneath the rust and mud, and the exhaust is just loud enough to hear him pull in the driveway without bothering the neighbors.

Michelle continues to spoil her chickens and they overwintered well. The 7 hens we have average 5-6 eggs a day. I can only assume they are rotating their days off. The chickens are enjoying that the snow is mostly gone, revealing a bounteous supply of gravel (and mud) to hunt and peck at to their little hearts content. One of my colonies of honey bees overwintered well while the others quit the farm, or more accurately, bought it. Michelle's women's Bible study group is going well. It has been a blessing for the ladies in the community for fellowship and spiritual food. I continue to lead the singing/worship portion of Church services on Sunday. Benjamin and I fill in for dad when he is required elsewhere. Our regular Wednesday night Bible study is going well and we continue our men's group every Friday morning.

Things here at the shelter are busy. We have 3 single men and 3 single women in emergency shelter, and 2 single men in transitional housing. In August we hired a part-time case manager to help out with our caseload. Her name is Ilirijana and she is currently in Africa (Uganda) on a mission trip. Kathy and Russ continue to do an incredible job handling most of the everyday needs of the residents. It is such a blessing to have brothers and sisters in Christ that work very well together to split the workload so no one of us is overwhelmed. We continue to do a lot of transportation for our residents. Thankfully this year both heating fuel and transportation fuel prices have been reasonable. We are serving a total of 8 households, occupying all of our 4 apartments. We do have a couple of empty beds for singles so we don't have to turn people away, but we get calls almost every day. Overall things are going smoothly here at the shelter; our program participation numbers are consistent through these last 6 years. We encourage our residents to join us in Church, Bible studies, and fellowship groups but they are not required to attend. Some of our residents are interested in the discussions and message while too many are not. All we can do is provide the opportunity.

In the last 6 years we have served more than 220 residents providing almost 11,000 shelter nights. Annually we receive approximately 120 calls from people looking for shelter. We continue to average about 5 residents per night. We continue to help people transitioning from jail, rehab, and probation/parole providing a stable supervised place from which they could find employment and seek housing. Please keep in prayer our staff as we struggle to reach out to our residents. We are praying for opportunities to minister to not only their physical needs but also their spiritual needs. Please continue to pray for our residents as they struggle to grasp hold of stability and sobriety. Please keep in prayer our staff/volunteers and their families.

Thank you for your continued prayers. It is through your persevering faith in God's ministry here that we are able to keep doing His work in our community. We are so thankful for your donations of time spent in prayer on our behalf, the gifts of day-to-day supplies, and your generosity of financial support that keeps us moving forward in HIS perfect plan.
