The last three months have been busy with blessings and challenges. In December and January we had a time of transition for Sunday service. We finished our series on the incarnation of Christ on Sunday the 24th. By mid-



January we started our series from Luke on the Passion of Christ beginning with the Last supper. This series will culminate on resurrection Sunday. Illness continues to plague members of our congregation. We ask your prayers on their behalf, some have pneumonia, and others are waiting on results from medical tests. We also need your prayers for our continued health and strength to minister.

Our men's Bible study is resuming in February. Our study will be a series on indigenous faith. We will be using study materials by Pastor Stephen Craig Smith, the head of Native Rescue Ministries, and a member of the White Earth band of the Ojibwe. In the ladies Bible study Cheryl has finished the study on the names of God and they are now studying the promises of God. In the Junior church ministry Cheryl lead the children in a study of each of the characters of the Nativity. During February she will teach them about God's love. The children have been memorizing Scripture from each of the lessons. It is gratifying to hear the children hiding God's word in their hearts.

Winter seems to be leveling off now. The snow is deep in some places, the temperatures still dip into the single digits, and there is gratitude that this winter hasn't been as long or as hard as we've had in previous years. Yet we are all glad for the signs of Spring we occasionally see!

Our lives can be like the seasons, can't they? We all go through times of drought, sickness of the soul, never feeling the Son shine in our life. We have so many hurts and struggles within our community. January was a hard month for our church, for we buried two brothers within 2 weeks of each other. One was alcohol related, while the other has yet to be determined. Their deaths were sudden and unexpected. Please pray for the Shepard family as the grief is still new and so raw!

I know these problems are not particular to our area, but within the Native community, these situations are more pronounced and more prevalent. There are several factors that lead to this, but it is our purpose here, as ambassadors of Christ, to show the way we can be set free from the bonds of sin and

addiction. It is a tough struggle when you are battling forces that don't want to let go of the people they hold. All too often, it appears as if the people themselves don't want to hear the way to freedom. However difficult the struggle, however hard the resistance, we won't be silent. We will continue doing what the Lord has called us to do, without shame, without apology, but with the Love of our Savior shining through us.

We have averaged 20 families at the mission pantry each week, and a dozen came to the church pantry last month. Our church pantry this month was on the 14th and nine families came for help. Thank you for your ongoing prayers for the ministry.

Prayer requests: Illness among members of the congregation. Continued strength and health for us. Openness and opportunities to bring the gospel into the community. Church growth, and spiritual fruit that remains. We will be visiting Plymouth church of Oshkosh in April to bring the message and share the ministry. This winter the furnace in the cafeteria has broken causing damage to the building. The furnace is located in the ceiling. The cost of replacing the furnace and making the repairs to the building will cost \$10,000. Part of the repairs needed to the building is to add a proper furnace and mechanical room. This will require adding a few feet to the building and will add to the cost of the repairs. The cost of adding to the building will be an additional \$10,000. This work will need to be done this summer before next winter.

NEW HOPE SHELTER & TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

Matthew 25:40 "The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.' (NIV)

There are times in life where we are blessed to find ourselves on the helping end, being able to help meet both the physical and spiritual needs of those around us.

It's also important to remember the times when we were on the receiving end, being the 'least of these' that needed food, water, warmth, companionship, and comfort when times got tough. We need each other, both to get out of our own rut of selfishness and serve each other, and to rely on each other for the comfort, fellowship, and unity of purpose that scripture urges us to keep. "Therefore in your concord and harmonious love, Jesus Christ is sung." –Ignatius of Antioch

January and February are our slowest months here at the shelter. We were able to use that time to unclog frozen sewer lines in our cafeteria building, replace the countertops and sinks in both the men's and women's bathrooms here in

the shelter, and install a baler to bale the cardboard the pantry generates and bale the clothing that we recycle as a fundraiser for the shelter. March has brought us 8 new residents in the first two weeks and we are busy juggling schedules to keep everyone headed in a productive direction. We are very busy at the moment and every day is a new adventure of opportunity!

As winter winds down the shelters' activities usually spool up. Spring activities begin to dominate our attention while we prepare for summer. Our call volume goes up as people begin to look for the seasonal work that warmer weather brings. We are bringing many of our residents to church and Bible study with us and our staff and volunteers here at the shelter work together to make that possible. We pray that He will prepare the hearts of our residents to be open to the Word of God.



Michelle and I are enjoying the longer days and anxiously making plans for the summers activities. She is hoping to get a few more chickens and I am preparing for the upcoming beekeeping season.

Our youngest son, Jonah, received his temporary driving permit so I have been running the roads with him while he learns to drive. He is looking forward to the high school baseball season and getting his driver's license this summer. He is still working at a local sporting goods/hunting/fishing store and is excited about opening day of fishing season.

Chase moved into an apartment of his own last fall and is enjoying his job at a local machine shop. He keeps 2-3 CNC machines busy cranking out parts. He has been there for 10 months now and has full health insurance and benefits!

Things here at the shelter are getting busier by the day. We just had two men check out last week and we currently have 2 single men and 4 single women in emergency shelter, and 1 single man in transitional housing. God's timing is always perfect, when things get busier in one area they usually slowdown in another area. We are serving a total of 7 households, occupying all 4 of our apartments. Right now we have 2 empty beds but I don't expect them to stay that way for long, we get calls every day. Overall things are going as smoothly here at the shelter as we could possibly expect. We encourage our residents to join us in church, Bible studies, and fellowship groups but they are not required to attend. Some of our residents are interested in the discussions and message while too many are not. All we can do is provide the opportunity.

Kathy, Eugene, and Russ continue to do an incredible job handling most of the everyday needs of the residents. It is such a blessing to have brothers and sisters in Christ that work very well together to split the workload so no one of us is overwhelmed. We continue to do a lot of transportation for our residents.

Thank you for your continued prayers. It is through your persevering faith in God's ministry here that we are able to keep doing His work in our community. We are so thankful for your donations of time spent in prayer on our behalf, the gifts of day-to-day supplies, and your generosity of financial support that keeps us moving forward in HIS perfect plan.
