Dear Friends,

The previous months have held many opportunities for challenge and adaptation. Once the state reopened, our study in I Corinthians became in-person instead of just virtual. As we studied chapter 15 we saw the proofs of the



resurrection, the consequences of rejecting the resurrection, the significance of the resurrection, the nature of the resurrection, the incentives provided by the resurrection, and the theological implications of the resurrection. In chapter 16 we studied teaching on giving, qualities of an effective servant of God, and love within the Christian fellowship. We are now currently studying the book of Ruth, and learning of our kinsmen Redeemer, Jesus Christ. Some church members are still staying in because of the pandemic.

In Junior church Cheryl began teaching the children from passages in the Scripture that mention the eagle since it is so integral to all parts of native culture. These passages taught the children vital spiritual truths in a way that resonated with them. Hello everyone!

Well, Autumn is in full swing here, with the leaves turning their various colors of orange, purple, red, and yellow. It truly is a breath taking sight! The nights are getting cooler and our warmer clothes are coming out of storage. Before we know it, snow flurries will be coming down from the heavens, adding another texture to view out our windows.

Our church services having been going well, with a few breaks due to some members being sick with COVID-19. They are all doing well and have recovered completely, for which we are very grateful for. We are studying the book of Genesis, going verse by verse, and discovering just how much important information is packed into a few chapters.

Our family is doing well. Adam is slowly being able to walk with just his shoes on and not with a walking boot. He still has pain and quite a bit of swelling in his foot, which we are guessing is being caused by one of the large screws in his ankle that we are sure will need to be taken out in November. Samuel, who is now 7, will also be having surgery in the next few months on his right leg. The tendon at his ankle is very tight and it doesn't allow his heel to touch the floor as he walks, leaving him to walk on the pad of his foot and his toes. We will have a conference with his orthopedic surgeon at the end of this month to talk about in detail what this surgery will entail.

The Forest County Potawatomi tribe has laid off the majority of their employees, which is particularly difficult in an already economically depressed community. The jobs are just not as forth coming as they may be in more populated areas. The amount of cases in our county is continuing to slowly rise and it is very obvious that it's no longer an "if" we will get sick, but "when".

Please keep all of us in your prayers, for the Lord is where we get our strength from. He is in control and we are so grateful to find peace in that! Please keep praying that we are able to not only apply that truth to our lives, but to also show to our community that this peace is possible and attainable.

We had neither VBS or camp this year because the summer groups canceled, and the tribes made it clear they did not want to send their children until the pandemic is over.

Both pantries have seen a drop in traffic. The mission pantry only sees three to five people each Wednesday. Our church pantry has three to seven families coming each month. This is a significant drop from the number of families before pandemic, when it was between eight and seventeen. Only recently are we allowed to visit people in the hospital again, and a mask is required. Thank you for your prayer and support.



NEW HOPE SHELTER & TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work. 2 Timothy 3:16-17

When I read this passage I hear a lot of questions in my head. I ask myself, am I "thoroughly equipped"? Are my children? Obviously it's an ongoing process,

not an event. Am I actively working towards it? Am I avoiding it at times for fear of responsibility? Am I avoiding rebuke or correction in myself or others for fear of hurt feelings? If I understand the study of scripture as "training", like in a gym, am I overweight and out of shape spiritually? Round is a shape right? Am I taking my training seriously enough? Did I do anything today to continue in my training? I made some firewood, does that count? I cemented a post in the ground, how about that? I think it's important to have these conversations with ourselves, that we continually reflect on scripture to both challenge and drive us to actively fight the spiritual status quo. As short-sighted as it is, some days it feels easier to make firewood, but nevertheless we persevere.

While this summer was busy, it was a different kind of busy than a normal year. We adapted and remained flexible and the Lord placed in front of us tasks to accomplish.

Michelle is currently working both from home and in the office, alternating her schedule several days a week. Her employer is adapting new methods to remain both productive and safe. We are thankful to both remain employed. We are excited to do some fall camping throughout the month of October.

Our youngest son, Jonah (18), is working part-time jobs when he can find them while looking for full-time work. We are very proud of the hardworking man he is becoming.

Our oldest son Chase (22) JUST GOT MARRIED!! We are so blessed to welcome our new daughter-inlove Brooke to the family! Their wedding was a challenge to facilitate this year but they pulled it off with flying colors. They were hoping to have a honeymoon this fall but with the current travel restrictions they are now planning for mid-winter.

Things at the shelter have been mostly normal. We are currently bursting at the seams with residents, using our transitional housing apartments as overflow for emergency shelter rooms. There are obviously still several barriers to housing and employment but thankfully our residents and staff have been able to stay safe and healthy here with us. Funding is always a concern and for some reason this year more than most as many of our grants come from private corporations which are struggling but we trust God's plan! As always we are praying that God guides and directs this project and we trust His hand in all things. Please be in prayer with us that we continue to walk in His will and obedience to His plan. As of this afternoon we currently have 2 single men, 3 single ladies, and a family of 5 in emergency shelter. We had 2 men check out last week. Overall things at the shelter are going as smoothly as we could expect. We encourage our residents to join us in church, Bible studies, and fellowship groups but they are not required to attend. We pray that He will prepare the hearts of our residents to be open to the Word of God.

For the last several months we have had a new volunteer here at the shelter, working with the residents as a case manager. His name is Fran and he is a biblically-based Christian counselor. He spends time talking with the residents, focusing on their mental health and spiritual needs. He has been a blessing to work and fellowship with. Please keep him in your prayers as he ministers to our residents.

Kathy, Eugene, Russ and Fran continue to do an incredible job handling most of the everyday needs of the residents. It is such a blessing to have brothers and sisters in Christ that work very well together to split the workload so no one of us is overwhelmed.
